FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

FOR JULY 2023

s you know, there are some uncertainties concerning the expiration of the 30+ sets of covenants in Diamondhead.

The POA has long supported pursuing definitive action by the MS Supreme Court in order to provide a clear and concise solution to the situation. Recent rulings in various courts have further confused the issue, as their opinions seem to contradict each other.

All parties in this dispute agree that the final ruling MUST come from the MS Supreme Court and that should occur as soon as feasible. MS has very few laws dealing with POA's/HOA's, and the number of these entities in MS are increasing dramatically on a steady basis.

Attorneys on both sides of the issue appear to agree that the case which reaches the MS Supreme Court must be procedurally and materially sound in order to prevent the Court from remanding this complex issue back to a lower court.

If remanding occurs, then additional time and resources will be needed to get the issue back to the MS Supreme Court.

In short, we have two

opinions from two different courts that give us two different rulings.

This provides a perfect basis to get the Supreme Court to resolve this issue once and for all.

Once the most recent matter is in a position to be appealed, we will be appealing it, and hope for a final ruling in short order, but that will be dependent upon the Supreme Court's calendar. We will keep you posted.

At the deadline for this article, I do not know the results of the June 2023 amendments proposals.

The Club is averaging serving around 10,000+ customers a week. That's a large number of Food and Beverage interactions for the size of our kitchen facilities.

Presently, the entrance/ exit from Highpoint Drive onto Golf Club Drive at the "4-way stop" do not line up correctly.

The POA and the City traffic engineer have agreed with the concept of moving the Highpoint Road slightly to the west resulting in a normal looking "All Way Stop" intersection.

This realignment will benefit and be safer for everyone who drives through that intersection.

The POA recently completed an agreement with the

Elliott Homes corporation.

Some highlights are:

1) All Elliott properties that are sold in the DH Lakes area are required to become POA dues paying members.

Elliott said that they realize the added value all the POA amenities bring to the value of homes they are building.

2) Elliott will undertake various drainage improvements to their property area near #12 and # 13 holes on the Cardinal to prevent runoff from their properties onto the golf course land and lakes.

3) Elliott will build a construction road from Golf Club Drive that enters the area between the green on hole # 9 and the tee on hole #10 of the Cardinal and extends to the DH Lakes property.

Elliot already owns most of the property involved. The road will cross the golf cart path between the green on # 11 and the tee on #12 of the Cardinal.

Reminder—the developer of both courses inserted a 30-foot easement between the green and the next tee on every hole on both courses.

In addition to the Elliott agreement, the POA has a signed agreement with D R Horton who is developing the area which is located on the extension of Highpoint Drive. That agreement includes the requirement that all property owners in that area MUST become paying members of the POA.

Horton, similar to Elliott, has said that they realize the extra value added to these homes by the \$20 - \$30 million dollars of amenities that

The Bylaws of this Corporation be amended to remove the requirement of presence in person and/or by proxy for all Corporate action to be determined by vote of the membership; and that





Wednesday, July 12—Stay cool and explore the Biloxi Visitor's Center; historic exhibits and information, great view and, it's FREE!



Diamondhead Aviator -- Lessons Learned

Some things can't be taught in the classroom; they must be experienced. It's said that a new pilot is given an empty cup called experience and a full cup of luck. The trick is to fill your cup of experience before the cup of luck runs dry. On a warm summer day in 1990 I know I depleted some of my luck but the experience stays with me today.

I had just received my new Private Pilot certificate a few weeks prior and was ready to build some time while exploring those wonderful freedoms and adventures available only to pilots.

A friend of mine lived in Alabama, just northeast of Mobile and I had promised her a plane ride or at least a visit since she swore I'd never get her in a small plane. Near her home was a small airport with a turf runway. Mark Reynolds-North Mobile County field in Creola, Alabama has a two-thousand-foot turf runway that's eighty feet wide. Through all my training, I had never flown from anything but hard surface runways. Of course, I'd done my simulated soft field takeoffs and landings as required for certification but that teaches the theory of the maneuvers. You learn the how but many times, you aren't given the 'why'.

The Airplane Flying Handbook explains that a takeoff from a soft, rough or grass runway using normal techniques may reduce the airplane's ability to accelerate during takeoff roll and may prevent the airplane from reaching adequate takeoff speed. I apparently missed that part of the textbook.

The goal in a tricycle gear aircraft is to keep weight off the nosewheel and transfer weight from the main gear to the wings as soon as possible. Once the plane clears the surface, it's able to accelerate in ground effect and then you climb away at

either best rate or best angle of climb. In the Cessna 152, we always used ten degrees of flaps as the manual recommended.

My landing on the short grass runway was as near textbook as I could make it. After visiting for a few hours, enjoying lunch but failing to convince my friend to take a ride, I climbed in that 152 for my flight back to Lakefront Airport.

I taxied to the runway and after a quick runup, I started my takeoff roll. I had the elevator full up and the nosewheel lifted free of the grass, but I didn't seem to be accelerating. In what seemed like minutes, as the trees at the far end of the runway grew in my windscreen, my brain finally kicked into gear, and I realized I had left the flaps at zero. I selected ten degrees of flaps and the plane jumped off the grass.

I stared at those trees as my speed increased to best angle of climb speed and I climbed away, probably with a few tree branches in my wheels.

On that flight home I mentally kicked myself for forgetting flaps while finally understanding WHY I was using them in all my training flights.

Too Much of a Good Thing?

The use of flaps is an often-debated topic. The definition of a complex aircraft is one that has a controllable pitch prop, retractable landing gear AND flaps. I don't understand why the FAA hasn't removed flaps from that definition. Many years ago, most small planes didn't have flaps but now you'll be hard pressed to find one that doesn't.

Some say we should always use flaps for every takeoff. Save the tires, they say. Get off the runway sooner, they say.

Two words I shy away from in aviation are ALWAYS and NEV-ER. There are few absolutes in aviation and common sense, procedure and best practice should come before always or never. While flaps do provide lift, they also produce drag. The manual for the 1968 Cessna 172 says:

'Normal and obstacle clearance takeoffs are performed with wing flaps up. The use of ten degrees flaps will shorten the ground run approximately ten percent, but this advantage is lost in the climb to a fifty-foot obstacle.

Therefore, the use of ten degrees flaps is reserved for minimum ground runs or for takeoff from soft or rough fields with no obstacles ahead.'

In contrast, the Piper Lance manual recommends flaps for takeoff. As all lawyer driven book and video comments say, these are typical procedures, and you should refer to your aircraft's manual for specific procedures. The manufacturers spent many hours flight testing those planes. Some just perform better with flaps than others.

But flaps for takeoff usually produce only reduced runway lengths. The drag produced for that extra lift often hurts climb rate. If you're dealing with an obstacle at the end of the runway but runway length is not a problem, a flaps zero takeoff may be the best answer. As always, refer to the aircraft manual and

run the various configurations through the performance charts. There are too many factors for an absolute flaps or no-flaps for takeoff mindset. Better yet, take your plane out and compare the real world performance to the numbers provided in your aircraft's performance charts. That experience may show the 'why' of adding a fudge factor to what the charts say the plane can do.

We all know what it feelslike to be lonely as most of us have experienced such feelings. Playing bingo or other structured social activities provides an opportunity to get to know others. Going to play cards or taking up knitting or any number of ways to meet people will eventually pay off. Keep in mind many of us have social anxiety as it is one of the most common fears. So, when you meet people in your various daily activities, keep in mind some of them may also be ex-

periencing social anxiety and are looking to become your friend.

The first step is to take the plunge and attend an event of interest hosted in your community. You will soon discover people will reach out to you and you will begin to feel a part of your new group. Sure, at first you will feel anxious, but your anxiety will lessen as you begin interacting with your neighbors and people in your community. Once comfortable, take the opportunity to volunteer for projects. You will soon feel a part of the group, and your life will be significantly enhanced.

One such avenue for seniors to meet new friends is to participate in The Diamondhead Senior Village activities that are held on Tuesday and Thursdays at 10 am at the East Hancock Library. You are invited to come join us and we look forward to seeing you.


