FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

PRESIDENTS REPORT BY NANCY SISLOW PRESIDENT OF THE POA

Your POA Board spent September and October working the 2025 budget. We have felt continued threats to our income from more property owners with expired covenants who decide to not pay dues This factor and our attempts to reduce costs while still maintaining service are driving the budget for 2025. Additionally, recent comments made by the Hancock County Assessor that he may begin assessing property taxes on our amenities could add a large tax burden in 2026. The budget will be proposed for approval at the October Board Meeting. Meanwhile, the Board has continued its work of exploring the costs and value of each amenity to seek ways to streamline the association while assuring the best possible retention of all the amenities. It is the combination of all amenities that makes Diamondhead the special place to live and enjoy a recreational lifestyle.

Part of why we are facing these challenges today lies in the history of Diamondhead. With much thanks to Dr. Jim Keating, and the City of Diamondhead web page, I can share some of that history.

By 1985, the developers of Diamondhead (the Diamondhead Corporation which was renamed the Purcell Company) had achieved such growth of home, townhome and condo sales that they turned the management of the amenities to the newly formed property owner's association (POA). This transition is recorded legally as the Take-Over Agreement and spelled out the details which have guided every Board of Directors since then. The Board of Directors, made up of property owners elected by the property owners has its Board structure and terms of service defined in the agreement. The basic rules of meetings and Board communication, requiring membership meetings twice a year and voting standards were also set. The driving force behind every Board's action is a requirement that the amenities continue to be maintained at the level that they were at the time the agreement was executed. As each Board has done in the past, this current Board of Directors is looking at the income we have and what is needed to maintain all the amenities as they were given to us. As some property owners no longer pay dues, the challenge of maintaining amenities becomes financially more difficult. This Board is committed to 1.) finding ways to assure the best amenities we can with unpredictable income, 2.) to finding ways to maintain the service level while reducing expenses and 3.) to improve our income with creative approaches to the much-debated issue of the Property Owner's Association's right to require members to pay dues (which is what provides the income needed).

Diamondhead has been through many challenges and has grown and thrived despite each one. I know with involved members, good planning, creative thinking, and being open to working with others, we will

move through this challenge and come out strong.



DIAMONDHEAD AVIATION BY PAUL GILBERT

This year's hurricane season has become quite active with two storms hitting Florida in a short time. Helene dumped rain over the Carolinas, causing some of the worst flooding they've ever seen. With many roads washed out and others blocked by debris, air travel is often the best option. Tons of supplies have been flown into the area by groups like the Aerial Relief Network. I just got an email from another group asking for help from pilots to fly more supplies into three North Carolina airports. If you know

of any aircraft owners who might be interested in flying to these areas, send me an email and I'll put them in touch with the organizers. Hurricane Milton is making landfall as I'm writing this, so I'm sure there will be more need for planes and pilots in the coming weeks.

Flying into Storm Affected Regions

The old saying that a mile of runway will take you anywhere has never been more accurate than when using our aircraft for disaster relief efforts. There are just some places that large trucks can not get to after hurricanes, flood or fires. As pilots, we can provide desperately needed supplies but careful preflight planning is essential to safe operations.

Flight Restrictions

Pilots know that Temporary Flight Restrictions, or TFR's can pop up anywhere and you can guarantee some will pop up around disaster areas, but that doesn't always mean you can't enter the area. Prior coordination with the controlling agency may allow you to reach airports within a TFR. If that's not possible, there's usually an airport close by a that can be reached.

Keep in mind that roads to those airports may not be usable, so even if you can fly into an airport, those supplies may be stuck in place until someone can drive out to pick them up.

Prior coordination with local law enforcement or emergency services is advisable as we're getting reports of pilots being threatened with arrest for flying into these areas. Some municipalities are saying crews need to have special training for these operations. It seems they're making up the rules as they go, but either way, a bit of pre-planning may help navigate the evolving governmental quagmire.

Call Ahead Before Flying

Besides contacting air traffic agencies for airspace clearance, a call to the airport FBO or manager is advised to check on availability of fuel and airport conditions. It's a fair bet that some of the airport equipment such as windsock and runway lighting are not in working condition. A quick glance through NOTAMS for an airport we're planning to fly into shows the runway lights are out of service, so daytime operations are advised.

Trees or other debris may be blocking runways, taxiways or even might be intruding into the approach path.

A quick call to the airport can avoid any nasty surprises.

Watch Your Weight

How many of us do a weight and balance calculation for every flight? In a previous article, I recommended having a few pre-filled weight and balance forms in the aircraft for your typical loads. We may spend the bulk of our time flying solo or with only one passenger and with a standard fuel load of full tanks or half full and those standard weight and balance forms should cover those times but this is not your typical flight.

When flying supplies into disaster areas, it's almost guaranteed that you'll be flying at max takeoff weight. This is not the time to skip the math. The FAR's require that we become familiar with all aspects of the flight, to include runway lengths at departure and destination airports. Are you able to take off from your departure airport on a hot day at maximum takeoff weight? Will you be able to land at your destination?

What's your CG with

the back seats full of heavy supplies? Many people decide to remove rear seats to carry more supplies, the removal of seats must be included in the calculations.

A limitation that is seldom considered is floor loading. Most manuals will list a maximum weight per square foot and keeping within this limit can avoid damage to your aircraft. (And don't forget that we must be able to secure that load for the flight)

This type of flying requires more preparation than the average flights most of us do but it can be extremely rewarding.

Cruisin the Coast is here again and the fly-by has been set up. Unfortunately, I'm out of town for this event but it should be a great chance for our local pilots to participate in America's largest block party. If I get some pictures from the event, I'll post them on the Diamondhead Aviators Facebook page.

If you find yourself wondering why some gals appear in one flight for one event and in another for the next game, that is because what flight you end up in depends on your handicap and just how many gals in that handicap range are playing on any given day. With dryer and a bit cooler weather, we look forward to more gals and more golf.

HONEST HANDICAPPING BY BRIGITTE BECKER, DIAMONDHEAD GOLF HANDICAPPING COMMITTEE MEMBER Do you owe it to your fellow golfers to carry an honest handicap? The short answer to the question is a resounding YES. A longer answer is that most golfers want to play with something on the line, whether it's a round of drinks, a dollar bill or just bragging rights. Whether it's an individual game or a team game, an honest handicap evens the playing field.

There's nothing like playing a team game and expecting your A player to hit lights out, because you know their handicap index. And as you play the game you suddenly realize your A player plays no better than you, and it's not just an "off day". Or, you are playing an individual game against a D player, and suddenly by the 4th hole they are 5 strokes ahead of you, and it's not just a "good day".

The old "S" word comes to mind, yes, that dirty word...sandbagger. Most s-word players say they don't enter all their scores in GHIN because they are only playing a friendly game with their regular "group". But it's those scores for those everyday games that create an honest to goodness handicap index and fair play amongst the group members.

The right to play in a friendly group game is not the only reason for carrying a handicap. There are a significant number of pragmatic reasons, other than playing in club events. Did you know if you go overseas, where many of us have gone since Covid restrictions have been lifted, many of the courses in Europe and England require it. Some even enforce a maximum handicap which has less to do with mandating a certain skill level than it is about ensuring that golfers know how to move around a course and play at a reasonable pace.


