FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

Your POA Board spent the past month working on ways to trim costs and exploring ways to develop consistent funding for the future. One plan by previous Boards was to assure that the Bylaws affirmed the requirement that property owners pay dues to support the amenities. That plan was known to require legal testing and the recent ruling by the Court has shown that the plan will not work. So, one of the costs that was eliminated was the cost of legal fees to pursue, through the court system, the idea that the bylaws provide a permanent requirement for all property owners to pay dues to support the amenities. The notice of the Board's action to that end was sent out in an E-blast, through our Facebook page, and posted on the POA web page. In case you missed it, it can be found by typing this into the search bar of your computer - https:// diamondheadms.org/wp-content/ uploads/2024/12/2024DecPOAAnnouncement.1.pdf.

Based on that decision, the Board is now working on other approaches to finding funds to support the amenities. This work will cause us to spend your dues with that focus in mind. A permanent solution must be found, or we will suffer the consequences of inaction that may include the loss of amenities. Some responses on social media have alluded to POA Boards making poor decisions, to spending funds incorrectly and to pursuing legal action inappropriately.

However, every past Board has acted to the best of their ability in the best interest of the organization as they saw it at the time.

This challenge of funding the support of the amenities requires more than 11 concerned members can do, as there are many nuances to consider in doing the right thing. This Board will be seeking expert advice. I plan to share any ideas as they become more concrete than just a dream.

Diamondhead has met many challenges head on in its past. One of the biggest was Hurricane Katrina, who came ashore on August 29, 2005. There are many heroic stories of how this community coped with the loss of almost 250 homes in the area south of I-10, flooding of 460 homes throughout the community in low-lying areas, impassable roads, with a week without water and 30 days without electricity, financial devastation to all who were affected and the huge change in the population as those from the coastal towns of Bay St. Louis, Waveland, Pass Christian who were in need of a home and safety moved to the available 3500 homes in Diamondhead. This community pulled together then and it will do so now as we face the challenges of our future. Mississippians have always helped each other. I know we will do that now.

I, and all the Members of the Board, thank you for the opportunity to serve the Diamondhead Property Owners Association and its great amenities.

We are excited to announce a new library program beginning in

January: True Crime Tuesdays!, from 10 – 11 AM on Tuesday, January 14. For each session on the second Monday of the month, I will present a juicy, sometimes strange (but never too scary!) crime story: some topics will come straight from the headlines; others will be more obscure, but no less interesting. I'll do the research, you bring your questions and theories, and together we'll try to answer, "What were they thinking?!"

Community Generosity Overflows: Diamondhead Exceeds Toys for Tots Goals!

Over the holiday season, you may have noticed white cardboard boxes scattered throughout Diamondhead and specifically at The Club. These boxes, decorated with a red toy train and the words "Toys for Tots" stenciled on the side, were placed to collect new, unwrapped toys for the holiday season. The goal was to bring joy to children in need within our community.

This toy collection initiative was a collaborative effort involving the Marine Reserve forces based at the Gulfport naval base, the Diamondhead Property Owners Association (POA), and Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2880. A total of six collection boxes were filled by the Patrons of The Club and five more were filled by friends and comrades of the VFW.

Thanks to the overwhelming generosity of the

community, the Marines picked up the boxes in early December, finding each one filled to capacity—plus an additional lagniappe stack of extra toys on top. The 2024 Toys for Tots donations from Diamondhead far exceeded last year's contributions, marking a significant increase in local giving.

Nationally, the Toys for Tots program was started in 1947 by a Marine Reservist and his wife. It's a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, which was launched as a national campaign by the Marine Corps Reserves in 1948.

The mission of the program is "to collect new unwrapped toys and distribute those toys to less fortunate children" at Christmas time each year.

The Diamondhead VFW Post is thrilled at our local response to the program and look forward to the next giving season to top 2024 numbers. If you would be interested in hosting a Toys for Tots

Tired of being grounded by an overcast cloud layer? How about working on the instrument rating? It's the most useful rating a pilot can have. The skills acquired in training will improve heading and altitude

control and can ease the weather anxiety many non-instrument rated pilots face when marginal weather moves in.

When people think of flight under Instrument Flight Rules (IFR), they may imagine flight in clouds the whole trip, but most flights involve a brief climb through a cloud layer, followed by cruise in clear air. The descent into clouds during the approach

usually lasts only ten or fifteen minutes before the runway starts to appear through the haze. Sure, there are days when clouds are all the way to the ground, but part of instrument training is learning when to keep it in the hangar and wait for better weather.

Building a Path to Proficiency

The flight review required by part 61 of the regulations requires a minimum of one hour of ground training and an hour of flight with a flight instructor. You must have had a flight review within the last twenty-four calendar months. Minus a few

finer points, this and three landings in the past ninety days are all the FAA requires for pilot currency for general aviation flying. But is that really enough? How about a New Year's resolution to spend an hour or two with a flight instructor each year? By the time your flight review is due, your skills will be sharp as ever and the flight review will be just a formality.

a formality.

There are ways to achieve your currency goals without doing the flight review. WINGS seminars are scheduled throughout the year and many of them can be done remotely through webinars. Visit faasafety.gov to search for seminars and courses in various subject areas. Most events give

credit you can use to complete a phase of the WINGS program which can be used to satisfy the requirement for the flight review. If you're unfamiliar with the WINGS program, check out this link: https://www.faasafety.gov/documents/Wings_Manual.pdf

Another way to bypass the flight review is by earning a new certificate or rating. How about moving up to the Commercial certificate or the above-mentioned Instrument Rating? Adding a multi-engine or glider rating can introduce new dimensions to your flying. With a new certificate, your due date for the flight review is reset, and you're good to go for another twenty-four calendar months.


My next goal is a sea plane add on. I'm looking forward to the challenge of placing over a ton of metal smoothly onto the surface of nearby lakes and rivers. Looking through the seaplane handbook produced by the FAA, I can see it involves a whole new world, more akin to sailing. 
