our POA Board spent the past month continuing to find ways to trim costs and exploring ways to develop consistent funding for the future. We have also interviewed some excellent candidates for the position of General Manager. Trying to manage a large corporation without a full time, paid key officer has been a challenge for this Board of volunteers. Given our uncertain future, a General Manager is a must. It is hoped that by the time you read this, one will have selected and accepted the position (fingers-crossed).

Diamondhead's history has evolved as problems have been addressed, just as we are doing now. After Hurricane Katrina, the POA struggled with restoring the amenities and the POA Board began to contemplate if recovery would be easier if a city were formed. (I learned that the POA status as a not-for-profit corporation impacted our ability to obtain grants to help with repair, and that a city has more options to seek and retain grant funds.) In 2006, based on comparisons of remaining a POA, potential annexation by Bay St. Louis, and incorporation, the POA decided to begin the process to incorporate Diamondhead into a city. A committee of community members began by seeking volunteers, holding meetings to answer questions, and acquiring the required signatures to accompany the petition of incorporation for the State of Mississippi. Twothirds of the registered voters had to sign the petition. Legal challenges and continued discussions played out until Diamondhead was incorporated as a city in 2012.

As you can see, change and working for a new future takes time and effort. We may all be called upon to express our opinions and share in a project to assure our amenities remain integrated in our community.

I, and all the Members of the Board, thank you for the opportunity to serve the Diamondhead Property Owners Association and its great amenities.

Coastal Communities to Welcome 30+ Authors for Third Annual HOMEGROWN Event

The area's literary elite, bookworm's (avid readers!), storytellers, just plain regular folks, and aspiring writers are in for a treat that is not an exaggeration when you apply the description of "world class" to the event. Beginning with Simon & Schuster's best-selling author, Lisa Genova, amidst her national book tour to promote her newest book, MORE OR LESS MADDY, released on January 14th, people will get a chance to hear first-hand about a young woman (Maddy) diagnosed with bipolar disorder and having to grapple with its effects. Author Genova, a Harvard-educated neuroscientist, sprang into national prominence with her first novel, STILL ALICE, which was made into a hit film starring Julianne Moore, who won the best actor Academy Award for her role as a fifty-something professional wrestling with early Alzheimer's. Genova's book was one of two books selected for a community reading initiative that began last July in Diamondhead. According to Leah Holmes, branch manager of the East Hancock/Diamondhead library branch, this led to the publisher and author's interest in Coastal Mississippi. Author Genova will be presented IN CONVERSATION with another acclaimed author, Mississippi native Katy Simpson Smith, who was

recently awarded the adult fiction "Book of the Year" by the Mississippi Library Commission.

Not to be outdone by author Genova's high profile and national prominence, more than 30 other authors - some of the finest and most talented from Mississippi, New Orleans, and points beyond – will participate in live, in-person discussions of their books and what inspires them to be writers. Last year, nearly 400 people attended the HOMEGROWN literary event after the Hancock County Library System teamed with its Harrison County counterpart to produce and present a full day of programs that is free and open to the public. HOMEGROWN was created in November 2019, before COVID tabled plans to offer the annual Gulf Coast event with the talent to pull attendance from both the New Orleans and Mobile (AL) areas.

HOMEGROWN 2025 weaves a theme about "storytelling" through its various sessions according to Kevin Cole, who handles PR/Marketing for the library system. "Writers tell stories much of the time," stated Cole, "and Mississippians are known to be great storytellers." One of the most widely known and award-winning professional storytellers, Diane Williams (Jackson, MS) will lead a panel that is made up of authors, a musician, and an artist/photographer in attempt to present a multi-disciplinary program that cuts across a broad interest level. Margot Cooper (book: DEEP INSIDE THE BLUES), Dan Gutstein (book: POOR GAL), Kathryn Lewis, director of The Telling Trees Project in Stone County, and

Williams will present a lively discussion that is sure to appeal to a broad range of literary fans.

An authors panel that proved so popular last January that HOME-GROWN event organizers have decided to make it an annual a feature of the HOMEGROWN event. The session entitled, THE ART OF THE COOKBOOK will feature four authors/chefs and "foodies" whose books are especially popular. Malcolm White, former director of the Mississippi Arts Commission, and founder of the popular Hal & Mal's restaurant in Jackson will moderate a panel comprised of Mellissa M. Martin (new cookbook, BAYOU), from Mosquito Supper Club (NOLA), Dale Gray, author of the popular SOUTH OF SOMEWHERE, which chronicles Gray's travels as a foodie and resident of South Africa, South Korea, and now America's South, having moved to Mississippi with her husband (formerly in the U.S. military) whom she met while living in South Korea. Gray's blog following numbers in the hundreds of thousands. Author Matt Haines returns to the area with his comprehensive (and timely!) THE BIG BOOK OF KING CAKE, and popular author/chef and travel writer, Robert St. John (book: MISSISSIPPI MORNINGS) rounds out the stellar panel. Hancock County Library System executive director, John Brdecka noted that books by all of the participating authors will be available for sale. Authors will be available to sign/autograph their books for guests.

IN CONVERSATION sessions will also include a much anticipated hour-long discussion between New Orleans-based M.O. (Neal) Walsh, whose book, THE BIG DOOR PRIZE has recently inspired an Apple TV+ limited series that can now be viewed online, who will be talking with Beth Kander, a playwright and author of I MADE IT OUT OF CLAY, which was just published in December, and shot to the Amazon best sellers list amidst rave reviews. Walsh is the director of the Creative Writing Graduate Program at the University of New Orleans, while Kander has Missis-

Grief Support: Help for the pain of losing a loved one

If you have lost someone you love, you know just how painful and unbearable the feelings are. If you are still suffering the pain of loss or know someone who is going through this, there is help. There is a 6-week Grief Support Group that will be meeting again beginning February 26, 2025. If the loss was recent, or even sometime in the past, it can be a helpful way to deal with the lingering emptiness, loneliness, and host of other feelings that accompany death.

Grief is a normal human experience. If you are in a relationship in your life, whether it is marital, parent/child, sibling, friendship, or committed partnership, you will experience grief if one of the persons die. Grief expresses itself in a vast number of ways. It may be very clear that you are in pain from the loss. It can affect sleep, appetite, work, mood, thinking, productivity, or other relationships. If you find yourself "off" since your loss, that may be the way you are doing grief.

Regardless, there are ways to soften the pain, and one of the most effective ways is to share the loss with others who are also going through grief. A grief support group provides a safe, confidential place to share individual memories, thoughts, and feelings with others who understand your pain. As you listen to others in the group talk about their loss, it also has a healing effect for each member

of the group.

Please consider joining this group that is being offered in the Diamondhead community. It is facilitated by experienced counselors who want to help you process your loss and move forward in a healthy and positive way.

The group will meet at St. Thomas Episcopal Church at 5303 Diamondhead Circle, across from the Diamondhead Community Center. They begin at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, February 26 and will last for approximately an hour. Sessions are free to the participants. Diamondhead Aviation: Practice makes perfect

You don't get the perfect golf swing without years of practice. Musicians practice to maintain technical and motor skills. Why would anyone think practice isn't a key component to superior airmanship? Blue Angels pilots average around one hundred-twenty hours practice during the winter season and then rehearse their full routine the day before each

actual show. Every practice session is followed by an extensive and candid self critique.

If we're being honest with ourselves, where could we use more practice?

Skill levels depend greatly on the type of flying we do and the frequency of flights. But as a flight instructor, I often see the following weak areas.

Go-arounds: A go-around is always possible, but low altitude, unexpected go-arounds warrant special consideration. Maintaining control while around from low altitude may be ischanging from approach and landing phase to a climb is a lot to ask of anyone.

The Airplane Flying Handbook says, 'The go-around is not inherently dangerous in itself. It becomes dangerous only when delayed unduly or executed improperly.

The key to a good go-around is a prompt response. Remember, Power-Pitch-Climb-Configure. Since go-

result in delayed reaction times. Some pilots immediately start their well-practiced routine of checking fuel selector, primer, carb heat and the rest. But while this is being done, are you losing precious altitude while heading away from a good landing spot? Attempts to restore power should only be considered after pitching for best glide airspeed and turning toward your landing area.

If you lose power in cruise, immediately pitch for best glide airspeed. This may produce a climb and more altitude is always a good thing. While pitching for airspeed, start looking for a landing spot and turn toward it. After you've got the plane trimmed for best glide and you're heading to your landing spot, THEN you can start trying to restore power.

A word on landing spots. When considering landing spots, is a highway the best idea? That long, straight length of pavement looks perfect, but power lines and unpredictable cars and trucks can be hard to plan for. Open fields can be a good choice but soft mud or uneven surfaces may grab landing gear. Gear up or gear down? Time spent chair flying these situations alone or with other pilots could provide some valuable insights.

Stalls: While we're talking about startle factor, we might as well mention stalls. The stalls we do in training may be uncomfortable, but we know what's about to happen. Suddenly hearing the stall horn while less than a thousand feet above ground will make even seasoned pilots' hearts skip a beat or twelve. The reason we practice stalls in training is to teach stall awareness, recognition and build the muscle memory of stall recovery.

If this recovery procedure is not instinctual, it's too easy for the brain to override the muscles when trees are too close for comfort. But if we respond to the stall horn with a further increase in pitch, those trees will get a lot closer a lot faster. Forward pressure on the controls to reduce angle of attack is the only way to make that wing start flying again.

While training in the real aircraft, there's no way to surprise the student with an unexpected stall and it's not safe to practice stalls a low altitude. This can, however, be done in a simulator and I would highly recommend it if your flight school has access to a flight simulator.

Practice it until it's automatic. Pitch (forward control pressure), power (max available), reduce bank, pitch (return to pre-stall condition after regaining flying speed).

Using a Blue Angels style self-critique, think about what you could improve in your daily flying or preparation for the unexpected. Call up your friendly neighborhood flight instructor and practice, practice. As I mentioned last month, there are many seminars that cover areas of common deficiencies, and group flying activities can be a fantastic way of connecting with other pilots.

Until next month, blue skies.

February means the start of golf season for our golf guests and snowbird golfers too! Guest of members and our snowbird golfers many times become future annual golf members and Diamondhead residents. It's amazing to see how many of them fall in love with what Diamondhead has to offer and then make Diamondhead their new home. As members, we are all ambassadors for our club. Treat others golfers the way you would like to be treated at their golf course. Please show our guests and new members the hospitality Diamondhead is known for. With the beginning of golf season, we need to expect an increase in golfers on the golf course. Some of these golfers may be here for the first time. During the months of February through May, annual golf members should expect a round of golf to take approximately 4 hours and 15 minutes. Golf guests typically do not play in under 4 hours for the following reasons...1) not as familiar with vardages and club selection, 2) not as familiar with course layout in general, 3) not as familiar with greens, 4) use a slightly slower rental fleet golf cart, 5) taking in the new scenery, 6) enjoying the camaraderie and social side of the game, and 7) may stop at the turn briefly for a beverage or snack. Thirteen to fifteen minutes per hole leads to 4 hours and 15 minutes for an 18hole round of golf. If you encounter a serious pace of play issue, please contact the golf shop at (228) 255-3910 and our staff will do their very best to keep pace moving. When you have a full golf course everyone is going to feel a lost ball search from the groups ahead of you. Three and a half hour rounds may still happen but most likely will not be able to be maintained throughout peak season. Thanks in advance for your understanding and cooperation!

We are now issuing handicap cart decals for 2025 for those individuals that qualify. Please contact the Golf Shop for more information. There is an application and verification process that must be performed prior to annual golf members with private cart trail fees before a handicap cart decal will be issued.

Remember to post your scores to

WHS/GHIN if you are interested in playing in the many great golf events that are available for you at The Club. Golfers must have a current WHS/GHIN handicap index and a minimum of six (6) 18-hole scores, or equivalent, posted within 90 days of the event start date at the time of turning in your registration form and payment. As part of the efforts to maintain and properly utilize the World Handicap System/ GHIN at The Club at Diamondhead for our members, we have implemented this eligibility requirement to play in club events based on net scores or pre-flighted based on handicap/handicap index. Also, to give the tournament and handicap committees sufficient time to administer the new eligibility requirement and other event details, all club events that involve net scores or pre-flighted based on handicap/handicap index will have an entry deadline no less than five days before the event date. The entry deadlines posted for each event will be strictly adhered to, and no flexibility will be given. Fully completed entry forms, along with full payment, must be received before the entry deadline to participate in such club events.

We hosted our annual Candy Cane Classic on December 14th. This adult-junior par 3 challenge is always a blast and for a good cause. As part of the entry fee, players donate canned goods for the Hancock County Food Pantry and an unwrapped gift for Toys for Tots! We love to see everyone supporting the event and make memories. 

• 2023: Two scholarships were awarded — the JONMC annual scholarship to Andrew Payne and to Claire Chauvin who was awarded the JONMC scholarship sponsored by Silver Slipper.

2024: Scholarships were awarded to Nikki Chase who was the 2024 winner of JONMC annual scholarship, and to Jacques Holloway who was awarded the JONMC scholarship sponsored by Silver Slipper. 2024: Last year JONMC entered




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
