PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Your POA Board interviewed some excellent candidates for the position of General Manager in January and by February were happy to welcome Mr. Rick Goldstein to the position. Rick brings a wealth of business experience to the role, having worked in many areas helping companies find the right strategies for success. Rick has wasted no time reviewing the status of our financial situation and making small changes that will help meet our goal of a positive financial situation. Some members have reacted with discomfort with the change and a sudden new person, but we must assure we have a positive bottom line first and foremost. Change is not always easy, but in the end, it is inevitable, and the Board will work to assure it is for the best.

As I read the minutes of the Golf and Grounds Committee, I was reminded of a concern we all have because of the beautiful green spaces we are fortunate to have in our community.

Golf is a dangerous game!

According to a study by Golf Digest, approximately 40,000 golfers a year seek treatment for injuries caused by errant golf balls and flying golf club heads. The people who play the game of golf on Diamondhead's two wonderful courses are not all professionals. Many are quite talented in the game, and some are beginners.

Golf balls can fly in unpredictable directions and for unpredictable distances, despite what you might have seen on a televised golf game. Golf balls have a rubber core which is surrounded by thermoplastic layers,

making it a small hard object. Golf balls can fly at varying speeds based on how it is struck, anywhere from 0 to 160 mph, making it often hard to see. Golf balls are round but can bounce off any object so the flight path in not always predicable. Golf is played from sun rise to sun set in almost any weather that the golfer can manage. All this is to say that being near a golf course while the game is being played is like any other sport, you must always be on your toes to watch for the dangerous flying object. Some ways to be safe when golfers are present is to follow the rules posted at all roadway entry points and do not access the golf course unless you are a registered golfer that day. If you are playing golf, stay behind a golfer who is swinging a golf club. If traveling to the golf club and there is no other suitable route, pass by golfers only when they are moving forward to find their golf balls, otherwise wait until all golfers have hit their balls, then proceed quickly past them to a far. safe distance. Always wait before passing a green (the flat area with a flag) until all golfers have finished putting and are moving to the next hole.

Approach a hill or any place where you cannot see the full course with caution; a golf ball may come flying at you from far off. Dogs and children should not be on the golf course at all during daylight hours as golf balls can come from surprising places.

We are fortunate to have the green and open space, but like everything else in nature and sports, we must be wise and careful to be safe and enjoy it all.

A few web sites offer databases for restaurants. 100dollarhamburger.com has lots of information but now charges a subscription fee of ninety-nine cents a

Some local favorites are: LuLu's -- Jimmy Buffet's sister's restaurant just a few blocks away from Jack Edwards Airport in Gulf Shores, Alabama (JKA). They offer great food, an arcade, gift shop and a challenging rope course.

Boaters Association Mardi Gras Ball Celebrates Camelot

New King Akua Kai the 49th Tom Warren and his lovely Queen Sue Warren welcomed members and guests of the Diamondhead Boaters Association to the 2025 Mardi Gras Ball on February 1 at the Club at Diamondhead.


