It is budget time for the POA and GM Goldstein has held several budget workshops to seek suggestions from the Board, to have 2026 budget ready within the timeframe required. There are many challenges since we do not have a clear view of what 2026 will look like. We will be making hard decisions to come up with a reasonable budget to maintain the amenities while facing the possibility of a changing membership. It is hoped we can have an approved budget

The newly established committee to explore, improve and clarify the bylaws and membership obtained Board approval at the August meeting for obtaining legal support and revision of the Bylaws. The focus will be on an organization of the future and will eventually be presented in full. This committee is meeting often to attempt to have a full document that will include enhanced. cost-effective processes from which to make decisions and obtain membership approval. There are many details to consider for approval, but we must start somewhere.

The committee to Study the Conveyance of Ameni-

ties' charter was approved in August by the Board. This committee has reviewed the Resolution by the City of Diamondhead regarding their interest in many of the green spaces (including the Community Center building) that we had shared in the Board's Vision for the Future of the POA. Because the Board is guided by its fiduciary responsibility to properly manage the goals and assets of the POA, this is a very important decision that will have long term impact on Diamondhead. The Board is working hard to make the best, most logical, most informed decisions for the membership and the organization that we serve. The vote at the September meeting reflected that goal., and the Board is working to pursue the transition of selected amenities to the City.

This tedious process may challenge us, but we must do the right thing whenever possible. We must also think of ways to quickly change should unforeseen problems arise from our efforts. In the end, we all want our wonderful Diamondhead to remain.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Diamondhead Property Owners Association and its great amenities.

# Diamondhead Aviation: I Can't Get No Satisfaction

I often say pilots are never satisfied. At least those of us who took the professional pilot route. Working through Private Pilot training, everything was new. Landings were both exciting and scary. Approaching the runway at sixty knots (about seventy miles per hour) seemed so quick. Developing the feel for the landing flare and setting sixteen hundred pounds of aircraft gently onto the ground was a challenge.

Moving into twin engine aircraft was even more thrilling. So many more systems to handle. One engine inoperative aerodynamics became a factor. Approach speed increased to over a hundred miles per hour and weight increased to almost five thousand pounds.

But as the logged hours increased, even that started to feel a bit slow and the craving to fly faster and higher gave each passenger or cargo flight a sense of purpose. The goal was to move into jets, traveling through the thin, frigid air of thirty to forty thousand feet at near the speed of sound.

Then, after all that hard work, finally sitting in a state-of-the-art, one hundred ton jet, letting the autopilot handle the mundane tasks of keeping course and altitude, what are we doing? Looking down, wanting to be in a light single engine aircraft at treetop level and seventy knots. Yep, we're never satisfied.

While that may sound ungrateful, it really isn't. I still love every minute I'm in the air. But nostalgia is a powerful drug. Just like first loves and first cars, the raw thrill of new experiences leaves us constantly yearning for that sense of awe we had in those early days.

Even before my first flight, I remember going to the airport with my father and staring at the many planes on the ramp. Years later, walking to the flight line with my instructor for my first flight, I had that same sense of wonder and thrill at all I had yet

to learn.

By learning each new skill, greater proficiency is achieved, but each action that is coded into our muscle memory means the newness MUST wear away. Even though every landing is different, after thousands of landings, they can feel somewhat routine (Except for that hard landing I made last week. Ouch!).

A low level flight in a light aircraft brings back the exquisite beauty of flight. No fancy avionics required. No carefully prepared flight plan. Just floating on a light breeze at a thousand feet above the ground, seeing the world pass by at a relatively slow seventy knots. That never gets old.

More on Landings

The bit about the hard landing wasn't a joke. I made one of the hardest landings I've made in a while last week. Not enough to drive people into their seats and not Ryan Air status (A YouTube search for 'hard landing' will let you see some Earth-shattering landings with Ryan Air). But

since most people have no way to judge the quality of the flight other than the landing, most pilots are trying for landings similar to a feather on silk. With so many factors blending into each landing, the occasional hard landing is inevitable. What can we do to improve our landings?

Practice, practice—nothing helps us improve a skill better than repetition. But repeating poor technique a thousand times just reinforces poor technique. Landings are one area where regular flights with an instructor can really help. Slight tweaks to landing technique can produce large improvements.

Keep it Standard—Try to make every landing the same. Consistent traffic patterns give you consistent sight pictures. Consistent power settings eliminate guesswork. If your airspeed is all over the place, it's a



Find the power setting for your desired approach speed and as vou make vour final configuration setting, you can adjust power to that exact number. Only small changes should be required after that. If your runway has a VASI or PAPI, use it to compare to and reinforce the proper sight picture for the runway. This helps when flying to runways without glidepath guidance.

Flare—Many new students see the perfect landing flare as an expertly timed

transition from the approach attitude to landing attitude just before the wheels touch the runway. I wish I was that good. Indeed, the flare is the transition from approach pitch attitude to the landing attitude but it's much better to just try to fly the aircraft just above the runway. As the plane nears the runway, pitch up to keep it from descending with power at idle and your wheels should touch at the same time the wing stops producing lift. If the wheels touch before the wing stops flying, you're likely to bounce back into the air.

Flap Setting—Some people believe every landing should be made with full flaps. There are very few absolutes in aviation and flap setting is a perfect example. In gusty crosswinds, it may be better to land with partial flaps. Practice landings with flap settings from full to none and see how the aircraft behaves. Many planes have electric flaps and a failure of that system will require a noflap landing. It's a good idea to be prepared for the situation by getting some no-flap landing practice.

As last week's landing demonstrated, the occasional bad landing may still happen, but regular practice will ensure more feather on silk landings than a falling brick.





Thursday, October 30—City Park—New Orleans features several trails:




