FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

At the October open Board meeting, the motion to approve the donation and conveyance of amenities to the City of Diamondhead was approved. The amenities and properties that were included in this donation were the athletic fields at Noma Drive. playgrounds and ballfields at East Rec, the Twin Lakes recreation area, stormwater drainage lots identified by POA and City staff, the Community Center and its adjacent parking, the public works maintenance vard and the Airstrip with all related facilities and land. Conditions which were included in the donation were that parking at the amenities and properties remain available to the public, the amenities must be used for the same or similar purpose as their current use, the amenities must be maintained to the same standard as currently maintained, that portions of the public works yard be leased to the POA at a nominal fee, and the City assist with legal fees in the process of the transaction. The motion also included instructions for legal counsel to work in cooperation with the City to develop contracts for final approval of

On November 5, the Board held a Special Called Meeting and approved the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that had been signed the day before

the Board.

by the City of Diamondhead, continuing the process of conveyance of the amenities to the City. This MOU was then sent to the Purcell Corporation for their signature, paving the way for the final contract which should be approved shortly. The plan is to have this accomplished in time to demonstrate to the Hancock County Assessor that any property taxes associated with the defined properties for 2025 should be reduced and to have this conveyance help us manage the budget for 2026..

Developing and ultimately approving a budget for 2026 has been a challenge. It is hoped we can approve the expense portion of the budget at the November open Board meeting. We are finding ourselves with a minimally break-even budget and a very limited fund for capital expenses and infrastructure repairs. Thankfully hurricane season has not yet been a problem (finger-crossed).

Once the conveyance documents are complete, we need to look to planning the future of the remaining organization. Finding the right business plan and the legal steps to get to our goal are where we need to spend our energy. Membership support will help us prevail so our goal of a wonderful Diamondhead can be achieved.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Diamondhead Property Owners Association and its great amenities.

Scouting America Troop 210: A Season of Service, Leadership, and Adventure





The evergreen, known for its ability to thrive in harsh conditions is a symbol of inner strength and eternal life. With its ability to 'be shaped' and its remaining pliability, the boxwood shows us humility and willingness to learn. These are just a few examples of the seasonal beauty growing outside our windows this time of year.

family-friendly event and has their own party with crafts, festive treats and pictures with Santa. East Hancock Library will host their holiday party December 16 from 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. Diamondhead Garden Club has supported this event for years. Our Holiday Tree Committee spends hours meeting, planning and adorning a tree that beautifully captures the theme of the event. Over the years, our tree has received "People's Choice" award, third and first place at East Hancock and third place overall. We are fortunate to have a welcoming and community-focused library in Diamondhead. We hope you visit each branch of the Hancock County Library System throughout the month, view the magical trees on display and vote for your favorite.

Our November meeting was an educational experience as were joined by Mr. CJ Nickell-Templin, native plant associate with Mississippi State University Coastal Research and Extension Center. Mr. Templin showed examples and shared details for each of the different types of carnivorous plant species that are native to Mississippi. We learned how to cultivate them by reviewing proper soil and water requirements, dormancy requirements, propagation methods and the best type of vessel to use. By the end of the presentation, everyone felt equipped with knowledge to care for these rare and indigenous plants. We thank Mr. CJ Nickell-Templin for the time he spent with us and for expanding our awareness as gardeners.

Diamondhead Garden Club meets the third Wednesday of each month at Diamondhead Community Church in the Activities Room. We invite you to be with us Wednesday, December 17 for our next meeting, as we welcome Mr. Tracy Bryant from Beatline Nursery. Beatline Nursery, Garden Center and Gifts is a family-owned plant nursery that has served Long Beach and the surrounding Gulf Coast community since 1976. Join

us as Mr. Bryant shows us how to create Christmas floral and plant arrangements. We look forward to discovering new ways to embellish our homes for the holidays. Club social time begins at 9:30 a.m. with our meeting to follow at 10:00 a.m. All Diamondhead residents are welcome and encouraged to join us.

December in the Garden, "Winter Prep and Holiday Cheer": with winter's arrival, our gardening focus shifts to winter protection while planning and preparing for the year to come. Protect moveable plants from sudden changes in temperature by bringing them indoors, place layers of mulch or pine straw to a depth of 6-8 inches to protect your tender plants, and water plants well if there is a frost warning (moist soil holds and releases heat more effectively,

thus keeping the plant's roots warmer and helping to prevent damage). Prune trees to remove damaged or dead wood. After Christmas, have your live tree turned to mulch. Plant sweet peas, poppies and larkspur. Repair and sharpen mowers and tools. Order seeds for early spring planting. For the indoor gardener looking for something new, consider African violets, Christmas cactus, amaryllises, philodendrons, ferns and weeping figs. Feed your houseplants twice during winter months.



We are asking all

golf members and golf guests to abide by our golf cart regulations. All carts must remain on the cart path (all four tires) around tees and greens. Par 3s are cart path only at all times. All carts shall return to the cart path prior to 30 yards of the aprons of greens and bunkers unless you have a current vear handicap decal issued by the Golf Shop. Be sure to avoid any soft, wet ground or standing water on the golf course to help prevent unnecessary turf damage. Carts shall not be driven around the opposite side of the cart path of tees and greens. If you see anyone violating a cart rule, please let them know so that they are aware. If you see repeat offenders, please report to our Violations and Compliance Committee. If we all do our part, we can make a difference.

From time to time we are asked about private golf cart use, our private cart requirements for compliance at The Club at Diamondhead are as follows:

• Electric Powered or Gas Powered carts are allowed on the course

"Traditional" Body Type (i.e. no themed carts such as a cart modeled to look like a real car)

• Maximum Weight without passengers: 1200 lbs

•Maximum Dimensions: 118" Long x 83" High x 56" Wide

•Tires are no more than 22" in outer diameter with a maximum 16" inner diameter

•Tires are between 8" and 12" wide with turf tires (a specialized tire designed with a smooth, wide, and gentle tread pattern to prevent damage to grass and turf)

•Carts should be driven on the golf course at 19 mph or less; 12 mph or less in club parking lot and near clubhouse

•Cart is in good working condition and free of major damage or defects

• Conforms to all other community rules, regulations and guidelines

•Any disputes or concerns not specifically covered by this policy will be settled by the golf professional staff pending review from the general manager
