FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

After the November meeting, the board sadly received the resignation of Bill Blackwood as Treasurer. Bill served on the Board for almost 6 years, first as a Director, and recently as the Treasurer. He related that he found the demands of the role and recent changes in the financial situation to be so draining as to threaten his retirement and health. Bill served on the Board with integrity and intensity, constantly working to always give the POA his best. The Board recognizes the effort he gave to us all. Please be sure to thank Bill when you see him.

Because the remaining term of Treasurer is only 6 months, the Bylaws allowed the board to interview several excellent candidates for appointment to the vacant position. We selected Brice Howard and his appointment will be formally approved at the December Board meeting. Please welcome Brice and offer your support as we tackle the tough decisions of the coming year.

Since the Memorandum of Understanding regarding the transfer of the athletic fields at Noma Drive, playgrounds and ballfields at East Rec, the Twin Lakes recreation area, stormwater drainage lots, the Community Center and its adjacent parking, the public works maintenance yard and the Airstrip with all related facilities and land, was signed, work has

progressed on the final documents needed to complete the transfer. It is anticipated all conditions (parking at the amenities, properties remaining available to the public, maintaining the use for the same or similar purpose at the same standard as currently operated, leasing portions of the public works yard for a nominal fee, and assisting with legal fees) will be finalized in writing by the end of the year.

At the November Board meeting, the 2026 budget was approved. It is a lean and challenging budget that we will have to monitor and manage carefully in 2026. In past years boards were able to rest on the knowledge of mandated dues income. With the expiration of mandatory covenants, that has not been possible. We are having to look at our finances in a different way. Because income is of critical importance and payment of dues has been running behind projections, a Special Meeting of the Board was held on December 11, 2025. Rick Goldstein, General Manager, wanted the Board to be fully aware of the situation. No formal action was taken, but the Board will be watching to see what changes may need to be made to maintain the remaining amenities while we work to find the best plan for the future. A motion at the December meeting is intended to allow the GM to explore valuation of amenities should the need arise to offer them for sale. Tough decisions may soon have to be made.

In a past session the Board approved legal counsel to develop and propose a plan for the organization's future by the end of the year. We expect to review that

plan in early 2026.

Your support and understanding will help us prevail so our goal of a wonderful Diamondhead can be achieved.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the Diamondhead Property Owners Association and its great amenities.

Diamondhead Aviation: Precision on the Road and in the Air

As students begin their aviation journey, ground operations focus heavily on maintaining taxiway and runway centerline. With a single engine Cessna, you may get away with sloppy tracking of centerline because the wingspan is not large enough to risk hitting objects near the taxiway or runway. But when you're hauling around one or two hundred feet of wing in larger aircraft, that centerline provides a guarantee that your wings will clear nearby obstacles. Even with the relatively large wingspans of singles like the Cirrus and Piper Malibu at 38'4" and 42'10" respectively, poor centerline discipline could create lots of insurance claim paperwork.

During my years slinging two-wheel machines around racetracks, the focus was on finding and following a precise line and accurately repeating that line each time around. The best performance drivers can keep the perfect line within a foot or less. Leaned over, body just inches from the pavement, knee puck skimming along the road, a mistake in location could mean a crash or at least a poor setup for the next turn.

My life has been driven by the rigors of performance and precision. Lack of precision could result in a crash either in a plane or on the track. Maybe that is why I tend to be slightly critical of drivers on our public roads (okay, maybe more than

SLIGHTLY critical). When our new roundabouts were being built, social media posts were filled with comments saying how unnecessary they are and how confusing they can be. A good pilot is always learning. A good racer is always building the skills to shave seconds off lap times. So why do users of public roads never face the requirement to refresh their skills and knowledge of the rules of the road?

A quick stroll through local parking lots will show the cars that were apparently parked by Stevie Wonder when he was late for a meeting. Crossed lines, vehicles filling two and three spots. You may just assume those drivers were unable to color in the lines as kids and that may be true, but the lack of precision is not just in the parking world. Any time spent on America's roads will show people have forgotten some of the more basic rules of the road, such as no crossing a solid line or even that the left lane is for passing only. You'd think since their heads are already buried in their cell phones, they might as well Google some driving tips.

I've been known to bend the rules regarding speed limit on curvy roads. Motorcycle riding would be pretty boring without some aggressive riding around corners. An inattentive or sloppy driver allowing their three-ton vehicle to wander into the oncoming traffic in a blind curve makes for a dangerous situation. Pick a lane

and stick to it. One dangerous situation I see with our roundabouts is how people don't respect the TWO lanes and their purpose. This is especially true in the southern circle. I often see people in the left lane cut across the right lane to exit for the eastbound I-10 onramp. I'm dreading the day when someone plows into a car in the right lane.

Will my rants improve driving conditions?? I seriously doubt it. But while I may tend to wander and ramble on the page, I strive for precision on the roads just as in aircraft.

A Chill in the Air

Walking outside the other morning showed me in clear and frosty terms that winter is approaching. Don't forget to take extra care with some winter specific considerations.

Our air-cooled engines are going to have a difficult time waking up and oil temperatures will slowly increase to the normal operating range. Many southern based aircraft are not equipped with sump heaters, so an investment in a system to pump heated air into the engine compartment might prolong engine life, especially for aircraft that must live outside.

FAR 91.527 guides us on winter operations and says no pilot may take off with frost, ice or snow adhering to aircraft surfaces. Many of us remember that regulation saying we may polish frost on wings rather than completely removing it. In 2010, they changed the rule to strongly

discourage the practice, citing lack of data and manufacturer guidelines on what level of polish was required. It's best to make sure there is nothing adhering to wings and control surfaces as even small areas of contamination may reduce lift by thirty percent or more.

Winter's air mass cloud formations tend to blanket areas in overcast clouds, grounding VFR traffic for days. This is a great time to work on your instrument rating but be cautious flying in clouds on winter days. Moisture combined with freezing temperatures aloft is the perfect recipe for airframe icing and most GA aircraft are not approved for flight in these conditions. Inadvertent icing

encounters do happen. The key is to have an exit plan if ice does start to form.

Carburetor Ice is more likely in these conditions. If you're flying a carbureted aircraft, pay attention to RPM's or manifold pressure. A gradual reduction in engine power may be difficult to notice. If you have any doubts, run carb heat for a minute or two. If it starts sputtering and then RPM's increase, you likely cleared carb ice.

Enjoy those cloudless days after cold front passage and keep warm (But remember to use carbon monoxide indicators when the cabin heat is running).





Homestead exemption applications will be accepted from January 5, 2026 through April 1, 2026, office located at 854 Highway 90 Suite C, Applications must be filed in the Bay St. Louis office of Hancock County Tax Assessor between the hours of 8:00a.m. and 5:00p.m. You must be living in your home on or before January 1, 2026 to qualify for homestead exemption. The property must be your primary residence in order to qualify.

The following information is needed to file your application.

- A) Warranty deed
 - B) Cost of property
 - C) Down payment amount
 - D) License plate numbers for vehicles registered in Hancock County. (All vehicles owned must be registered in Hancock County.)
 - E) If you are age 65 or older, proof of age is required
 - F) If you are receiving 100% disability benefits, proof of your disability is required
 - G) Is any part of the property rented
 - H) Must have MS Driver's License and Social Security Number
- You must resubmit your homestead exemption application if, on or before January 1, 2026 any of the following occurred
- A) You became over 65 on or before January 1, 2026
 - B) You became 100% disabled service Connected veteran on or before January 1, 2026
 - C) You acquired a new residence
 - D) You acquired additional property that adjoins your homestead
 - E) Your marital status changed (divorced, widowed, separated, etc.)




