FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

We accomplished something special in 2025!!!

The Deeds of Dedication to transfer the athletic fields at Noma Drive, playgrounds and ballfields at East Rec, the Twin Lakes recreation area, the Community Center with adjacent parking, the public works maintenance yard, Airstrip and the stormwater drainage lots, were approved and signed at a Special Called Meeting of the Board of Directors on Monday, December 29, 2025 after the same action was taken the same day by the Diamondhead City Council. The Deeds outlined all conditions (parking at the amenities, properties remaining available to the public, maintaining the use for the same or similar purpose at the same standard as currently operated, leasing portions of the public works yard for a nominal fee to the POA, and assisting with legal fees) that were required for each amenity. Because President Sislow was out of town on that date, the POA Board formally approved Vice President Giarrusso to sign the Deeds. They were recorded with the Hancock County Chancery Clerk on December 30, 2025.

The Board, working with the

City Council, is very proud that this was accomplished by the end of the year. It took persistence and dedication by all involved. A big shout-out is due to Diamondhead City Mayor Anna Liese, City Council Members Gerard Maher, Shane Finley, Ricky Sheppard, Jesse Harwood, and Austin Clark; City Manager Jon McCraw and City Counsel Derek Cusik; and to the Property Owners Association Board President Nancy Sislow, Vice President Trey Giarrusso, Treasurer Brice Howard (and former Treasurer Bill Blackwood), Secretary Pat Burgoyne, Ex Officio Gary Becker, and Directors Ken Griffey, Ronald LaFontaine, Ernest Lee, Stewart Nutting, Bob Pineau, and Michael Tubbs; POA General Manager Rick Goldstein and Legal Counsels Rick Tubertini and Eric Granberry.

A Special Meeting of the Board was held on January 13, 2026 to continue the study of the financial position of the organization and to begin the process to determine a viable way to support the Golf Courses and associated services, the County Club building and grounds (pool, walking trail and tennis/pickleball courts), the marina and 3 pools throughout the community. Our legal counsel, as

requested, has provided one solution to manage these remaining amenities and that recommendation was considered at the meeting. There is much work to be done to determine where to go and how to get there while continuing to maintain the remaining amenities in the best condition we can afford.

At the same special meeting, during our discussion of the financial challenges for 2026, the Board authorized the GM to explore the sale of the Tennis Club to a Tennis professional with conditions that the office space be leased to the purchaser, and that deed restrictions ensure that it remain as a tennis facility including the right of first refusal by the POA, if the purchaser ever offers the tennis club for sale. A sale could assist the POA with its financial deficits while assuring a tennis presence in Diamondhead and benefitting current members of the tennis club.

The GM also reported adjustments in the 2026 budget that were made based on the transfer of amenities and these adjustments will help with our financial position. These adjustments include a reduction in expenses for taxes, insurance, and maintenance/repairs. Additionally, cost-saving changes made

in 2025 have helped reduce expenses for 2026, including measured liquor pours, improved inventory control, adjusted processes for the servers at The Club, as well as right-sizing staffing throughout the organization.

Challenging times are

ahead. Your support and understanding will help us prevail so the goal of a wonderful Diamondhead can be achieved.

The Board of Directors thank you for the opportunity to serve this Association and its amenities.

Happy February! We hope the new year has been treating you well and that you're enjoying the fun and festivities of Mardi Gras season. It's already been an exciting start to 2026 at the library—we recently wrapped up HOME GROWN: A Storied Exchange, which had a wonderful turnout.

A huge thank-you to everyone who volunteered, attended, and shared their talents on our panels alongside such incredible authors!

A few quick housekeeping notes: all five branches of the Hancock County Library System will be closed on Monday, February 16, for Presidents' Day, and Tuesday, February 17, for Mardi Gras. We're also thrilled to share that The Second Line, our new used bookstore inside the Bay St. Louis Public Library, will be opening later this month! Thank you to everyone who participated in voting for the bookstore's name. Every purchase directly supports the Library Foundation, which plays an es-

sential role in keeping all five branches thriving. Be sure to follow the library on social media for updates on the official opening date and hours.

Our weekly sewing class has been reimagined into a fun, skill-building series designed to help participants grow their confidence one project at a time.

In the first five-class series, students create an apron from start to finish. After completing that series, they may register for a second set of classes focused on sewing a bag, followed by a third and final series where students make a project pouch. Participants are asked to cover the cost of materials, which will never exceed \$20 per series. Materials are provided by the instructor, Paula Kirk, and payment is due to her at the first class. Because we have a limited number of sewing machines and instructors, class sizes are intentionally small, and registration is required. Currently, both our daytime and evening classes are full, but you're welcome to ask a staff member or the

instructor about joining the waitlist for the next session.

Now for our regular programming! Join us every Monday from 10:30–11:30 a.m. for story time and crafts.

Story time is a wonderful way to support early literacy and social development in young children, and we'd love to see you there. This month, Painting with Elen will take place on February 2nd from 1-2pm and 2:15-3:15pm. Please register through the library's website. Elen also leads Conversations in Spanish every Thursday from 2–3 p.m.

Strength and Flexibility meets every Friday from 10 a.m.–12 p.m. This

instructor-led, seated fitness class is perfect for older adults or patrons with disabilities who are looking for gentle movement and stretching. Please remember to bring water and wear comfortable clothing. Later on Fridays, from 1–3 p.m., we host Crafts and Conversation—a relaxed, come-and-go gathering where participants are welcome to bring their own projects and enjoy crafting alongside fellow creatives. This is an informal program with no instruction, just good company and conversation.

Medicare fraud.



Love for spring gardening is in the air this February. Early bird songs are a chorus for our mornings. A shift in light is happening, bringing us longer days and later sunsets. The dormant grass now shows whispers of green. All subtle signs that South Mississippi's spring awakening is here. An event club members look forward to each spring is our district meeting with The Spanish Trail Garden Club in South Mississippi. This district meeting brings together more than twenty garden clubs, all located close to or along the Gulf Coast. Named for the "Old Spanish Trail" which was one of the first continuous highways in the United States established in the 1920's. The route followed what is now largely U.S. Highway 90, instrumen-

tal in shaping South Mississippi's development, and our district garden club's name honors this historical connectivity. The Spanish Trail Garden Club comes together for educational workshops, guest speakers, and fellowship. These meetings provide information that support the vision and goals of Garden Clubs of Mississippi, Inc. along with National Garden Clubs, Inc.

She is well versed in birds, from our native Mississippi nesters to winged visitors passing through. One of her passion projects that many club members also participate in is an annual bird count. We encourage you to mark your calendars for The Great Backyard Bird Count, scheduled for February 13-16, 2026. To participate, log in: BirdCount.org. This will bring you to the official page. Scroll down and click on the tab, "Learn How to Participate." Then follow three steps listed that will allow you to be a part of this global event. This bird count is co-sponsored by the Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and is an annual event designed to connect us with our feathered friends and monitor their numbers and habits. Simple enough for everyone to participate, and fun too. Mrs. Lee encourages community members to add the Merlin

Bird ID app to their phones. It is free and a fantastic way to track birds anywhere you go. Once you begin using this app, you will likely find yourself using it time and time again. If you are a birdwatcher, like so many of us, Mrs. Lee also recommends the book, Peterson Field Guide to Birds of North America, written by Roger Tory Peterson. The book provides concise, accurate information about birds. The detailed illustrations are ideal for quick identification.

In January, we were fortunate to have Mrs. Connie

Harper join us as our guest speaker. Mrs. Harper instructed us on the wonderful world of daylilies, sharing her expert knowledge on these beautiful and resilient flowers. She explained that daylilies are easy to grow and bring vibrant color to our garden.

Diamondhead Garden Club meets the third Wednesday of each month at Diamondhead Community Church in the Activities Room. We hope you will join us Wednesday, February 18 for our next meeting, as we welcome Miss Rachel Bond,

from Pine Hills Nursery. Miss Bond's focus will be container planting. We look forward to gaining insight from her demonstrations. Club social time begins at 9:30 a.m. with our meeting to follow at 10:00 a.m. All Diamondhead residents are welcome.

Some historic Live Oaks fall just a bit short of these required measurements. We can still honor the significance of your tree. Your Live Oak would be 'recognized.' The owner of a recognized Live Oak would receive a certificate and a tree plaque. This also provides that your tree is on track for certification.





and then make Diamondhead their new home. As members, we are all ambassadors for our club. Treat other golfers the way you would like to be treated at their golf course. Please show our guests and new members the hospitality Diamondhead is known for. With the beginning of golf season, we need to expect an increase in golfers on the golf course. Some of these golfers may be here for the first time. During the months of February through May, annual golf members should expect a round of golf to take approximately 4 hours and 15 minutes. Golf guests typically do not play in under 4 hours for the following reasons...1) not as familiar with yardages and club selection, 2) not as familiar with course layout in general, 3) not as familiar with greens, 4) use a slightly slower rental fleet golf cart, 5) taking in the new scenery, 6) enjoying the camaraderie and social side of the game, and 7) may stop at the turn briefly for a beverage or snack. Thirteen to fifteen minutes per hole leads to 4 hours and 15 minutes for an 18-hole round of golf. If you encounter a serious pace of play issue (over 2 hours for 9 holes), please contact the golf shop at (228) 255-3910 and our staff will do their very best to keep pace moving. When you have a full golf course everyone is going to feel a lost ball search from the groups ahead of you. Three and a half hour rounds may still happen but most likely will not be able to be maintained throughout peak season. Thanks in advance for your understanding and cooperation!

We are now issuing handicap cart decals for 2026 for those individuals that qualify. Please contact the Golf Shop for more information. There is an application and verification process that must be performed prior to annual golf members with private cart trail fees before a handicap cart decal will be issued.

Remember to post your scores to

WHS/GHIN if you are interested in playing in the many great golf events that are available for you at The Club. Golfers must have a current WHS/GHIN handicap index and a minimum of six (6) 18-hole scores, or equivalent, posted within 90 days of the event start date at the time of turning in your registration form and payment. As part of the efforts to maintain and properly utilize the World Handicap System/GHIN at The Club at Diamondhead for our members, we have implemented this eligibility requirement to play in club events based on net scores or pre-flighted based on handicap/handicap index. Also, to give the tournament and handicap committees sufficient time to administer the new eligibility requirement and other event details, all club events that involve net scores or pre-flighted based on handicap/handicap index will have an entry deadline no less than five days before the event date. The entry deadlines posted for each event will be strictly adhered to, and no flexibility will be given. Fully completed entry forms, along with full payment, must be received before the entry deadline to participate in such club events.

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
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
